



Proposal Quality Is Not Proposal Maturity

Why major interdisciplinary pursuits require institutional structure before proposal review begins

Universities rarely lack strong researchers, experienced proposal staff, or capable former agency reviewers. Points of friction often appear earlier.

Major interdisciplinary pursuits begin gaining momentum long before the institution has made several conditions explicit.

CONDITION	EXECUTIVE QUESTION
Sponsorship	Who can authorize and defend the institutional pursuit?
Cross-unit ownership	Who owns the integrated outcome rather than one technical workstream?
Researcher capacity	Which commitments are protected and operationally feasible?
Partner commitments	Are external contributions, workshare, and intellectual-property rights documented rather than assumed?
Resource authority	What funding, staff, facilities, cost share, and administrative support are real?
Technical maturity	Are objectives connected to measurable Figures of Merit, dependencies, gates, and pivot conditions?

A proposal can be well written and solicitation-compliant while these conditions remain unresolved. By the time reviewers see the document, institutional immaturity is embedded in the pursuit.

Former agency leaders and research-development staff assess proposal quality. Moonbow Tech evaluates the institutional system that produces it.

The Institutional Proposal Maturity Baseline

A fixed-scope executive assessment for one consequential interdisciplinary or center-scale pursuit.

The baseline distinguishes established institutional conditions from assumptions and unresolved decisions that could destabilize a major pursuit.

A concise statement of the live institutional decision, unresolved conditions, and required leadership actions.
